

Becoming Mature in Christ

Being a parent of six children has reminded me the unique of each individual. Despite the fact that they all share Allison's and my DNA and were raised in the same household, they each developed in various ways and degrees. Furthermore, the process by which they have matured has differed with each child. Both their personalities and personal choices have affected their personal development.

This development process is not only true with personal growth but with our spiritual growth as well. As Christians who have been born again, *from above*, God's intention for us is progressive spiritual maturity. It is His will that we grow into greater and greater conformity to His Son, our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Just as we mature physically, mentally, and psychologically throughout our lives, we should likewise mature spiritually. Just as a lack of growth in any of those areas would indicate some abnormality, so too a lack of growth in our spiritual condition would indicate some form of spiritual malady.

Unfortunately, while it may be obvious and disconcerting when a person fails to develop in body, mind, and emotions, it is less noticeable and alarming when a person does not mature in faith. As a result, a person may not developed in any substantial degree of spirituality over his lifetime. Unfortunately, there is not an automatic relationship between spiritual and physical or mental or psychological growth. No matter how many years a person may have been a Christian, that passage of time is no guarantee that he has matured in Christ. Maturity in Christ is a spiritual process and grace.

The Bible teaches that spiritual growth is not ultimately something we can engineer. No matter how active or busy we might be doing the "things of God," God alone brings forth spiritual fruit in our lives (1 Cor 3:6-7). This does not mean that we are completely passive in our discipleship, but it is only by the gracious work of the Holy Spirit that we can experience growth in Christ. By faith we receive the supernatural grace of the Holy Spirit to put to death the old self and enliven the new self in the likeness of Christ.

So how conscious are you of your spiritual maturity? How much maturation can you see in your life that is clearly a work of the Lord? Have you come to the place in you spiritual maturity where you have become stagnant or not even concern about continuing to grow? We are bombarded everyday by the clamoring of our culture not to bother ourselves with such eternal matters but to pursue the fleeting pleasures of this world. And when it often appears that we take two steps backwards for every one step forward in our spiritual maturity, we can easily get discouraged in persevering. However, if our faith is genuine and the Holy Spirit truly dwells within us, we will by the grace of God press on toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus (Phil 3:14).

For that purpose, we will study Sinclair Ferguson's book, *Maturity: Growing Up and Going On in the Christian Life*, starting October 2 for our Wednesday Evening Bible Study. As we renew our devotion to Christ and our commitment to follow Him more closely and fervently, may we bring glory to our great God who has covenanted with us to form Christ in us.



Our theme Scripture for 2019 is Roman 8:1-2 - "There is therefore now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus. For the law of the Spirit of life has set you free in Christ Jesus from the law of sin and death."


Annual Women's Ministries meeting to be held on Saturday, October 12 at Bonclarken.



Challenges for Prayer

The EKD is a federation of 23 Lutheran, Reformed and United Protestant regional/national churches, but it suffers deep divisions on many levels. The more evangelical/conservative groups and congregations are concentrated in Württemberg, Siegerland and south Saxony. Steadily declining attendance - and therefore income - translates into not only low morale for congregations, but also increasingly empty and crumbling physical structures. Many of the Lutheran clergy do not even believe in life after death; it is often difficult for born-again ministers in the EKD to openly minister in their own churches! Since 2001, the need for evangelization is recognized, and new church-development concepts enjoy popularity; without Learn more about reaching the unreached at: a return to genuine faith in the Bible, however, new concepts and programs will never replace the need for renewal.
